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WELCOME TO THE REGION 47 CHILD CARE TOOLKIT

Helping employees navigate their child care needs.

As a working parent, having access to child care resources is essential for balancing work and family life. Having support with child care resources can significantly reduce stress, prevent absenteeism, and increase job satisfaction. When organizations address the child care needs of their employees, it shows a commitment to family well-being and helps create a more positive, supportive workplace. This Toolkit was designed to help businesses in our Region better support working parents and caregivers like you!

What is child care?

Child care refers to the care and supervision of young children by other adults when their parents or caregivers are working or busy. It supports working families by allowing parents to pursue their careers with the assurance that their children are in a safe and nurturing environment.





Why is finding quality care important for your family and you as an employee?

Quality care not only provides a structured setting for children to learn and socialize but also fosters their development. This support is vital for families striving to balance work and life effectively.

What are the different types of child care?

CHILD CARE CENTERS

These are formal facilities that provide care for a group of children, often structured by age and developmental stage. They are usually staffed by multiple caregivers and must adhere to state regulations regarding child-to-caregiver ratios, safety standards, and educational programs.

FAMILY CHILD CARE

This type of care takes place in a caregiver's home where they are licensed by the state to care for a small group of children.

Providers typically care for a mix of ages and are required to meet health, safety, and training standards set by the state.

LICENSED EXEMPT CARE

This includes child care that does not require a state license but may still be regulated under certain conditions, such as care provided by relatives, babysitters, or in informal settings. These providers typically care for a limited number of children and are not subject to the same regulations as licensed providers.

What is the Child Care Resource and Referral?

4-C: Community Coordinated Child Care, is our Region's Child Care Resource and Referral Agency (CCR&R). The CCR&R's role is to support families with:

- Finding child care
- Choosing quality care
- Paying for child care

You can contact 4-C to receive resources, request a list of child care providers, and complete a Child Care Assistance Program application.

Early Childhood Education in Region 47

In addition to child care, our Region has many Early Childhood Education programs and resources. With benefits similar to quality child care, Early Childhood Education helps set the stage for future success in school and life. It lays the foundation for your child's cognitive, emotional, and social development. Learn more about these programs on the O.W.L. page; your family may be able to wrap these programs into your child care plans.

Struggling to find child care?

Unfortunately, child care can be limited in our counties, and we know finding the right provider for your family may take time. Read the tips below for ideas on how to support your family while in transition to finding care.

- Place Your Family on Waitlists: Even if the list is long, put your family on the list. Family circumstances change and that list may go more quickly than you think!
- Look into Early Childhood Education
 Programs: Even though these programs are
 often part-time, they benefit young children,
 and you may be able to find wraparound child
 care options with family or friends.
- Talk to Your Employer: Discuss flexible work arrangements, schedules, or potentially working from home.





- Network with Friends and Family: Ask relatives, close friends, or neighbors if they can help with temporary care.
- Explore All Types of Care: If centers are full, learn more about local home-based Family Child Care or licensed exempt providers.
- Check Community Resources: Look into parent support groups, local churches, community centers, or libraries that may have connections.
- Prepare for Emergency Plans: Keep a list of emergency caregivers or backups in case of last-minute cancellations or unforeseen events.
